

(1) Renee Gibbs (moderator): Panel of Young Thinkers: Bringing Good News to Life through the Younger Generation. Come and hear from some young pro-life thinkers. Learn what they are thinking, what they are doing, and how they can make an impact in our churches and in society. There will be plenty of time for questions and dialog.



(2) Anthony Horvath: Bringing Good News to Life through

Biblical Manhood. Men, *as men*, have much to contribute to the struggle For Life. This workshop will explore God's plan for men and apply it to the 21st century with its distinct challenges and issues of importance.

- (3) Kim Ketola: Bringing Good News to Life through Biblical Womanhood. In our day, biblical womanhood is often portrayed as oppressive and regressive; marriage is denigrated and children are degraded. The workshop will present the good news of biblical womanhood as the hope for attaining to love, peace, and joy in our hearts and in our homes.
- (4) Ryan C. MacPherson, Ph.D.: Bringing Good News to Life in Defense of Marriage. Scripture teaches that marriage is a *divinely created lifelong union that celebrates sexual complementarity, children, and chastity*. This workshop will equip participants with practical strategies for proclaiming the rich significance of marriage in both church and society through God's gifts of natural law and Holy Scripture.
- (5) Alan Shlemon: Bringing Good News to Life by Making Abortion Unthinkable. To turn the cultural tide, we must master the art of pro-life persuasion—something easier than it sounds. It begins with three tasks that anyone can learn.
- (6) Rev. Dr. Kevin Voss: Bringing Good News to Life in the Petri Dish—Defending Adult Stem Cell Research. The "good news" is that the Lord in His wisdom has provided within our bodies the very means to heal many incurable diseases! You will learn about the clear moral distinction between embryonic and adult stem cell research.

Wesley J. Smith is a Senior Fellow in Human Rights and Bioethics at the Discovery Institute, a consultant to the International Task Force on Euthanasia and Assisted Suicide, and a special consultant for the Center for Bioethics and Culture. In May 2004, because of his work in bioethics, he was named by the *National Journal* as one of the

nation's top expert thinkers in bioengineering. In 2008, the Human Life Foundation named him a Great Defender of Life for his work against assisted suicide and euthanasia. Smith left the full time practice of law in 1985 to pursue a career in writing and public advocacy. He is the author or coauthor of eleven books. His latest book is A Rat is a Pig is a Dog is a Boy: The Human Cost of the Animal Rights Movement, a searing critique of the ideology and tactics of the animal liberation movement and a rousing defense of the unique importance of human exceptionalism. His writing has appeared nationally and internationally and he has appeared on thousands of television and radio talk/interview programs. Smith is often called upon by members of legislative and executive branches of government to advise on issues within his fields of expertise. He has testified as an expert witness in front of federal and state legislative committees, and has counseled government leaders internationally about matters of mutual concern. Smith is an international lecturer and public speaker, appearing frequently at political, university, medical, legal, disability rights, bioethics, religious, and community gatherings across the United States, Europe, Mexico, Canada, South Africa, Australia, and at the United Nation.



John-Paul Deddens is a graduate of the University of Illinois with a degree in engineering. He is the founder and Executive Director of Students for Life of Illinois, a non-profit organization providing resources, training and support to college students in and around Illinois. John-Paul has been featured in publications and appeared as a

guest on various radio programs to discuss the collegiate pro-life movement. His goal is to see effective and active pro-life groups on every college campus in Illinois. In addition to his work with SFLI, John-Paul also serves on the board of the Illinois Federation for Right to Life.



Rev. Mark Erickson is a professor at the Lutheran Brethren Seminary in Fergus Falls, Minnesota. His wife, Kristin, was president of LFL of North Dakota for 12 years. The Ericksons now live in Fergus Falls. Pastor Mark was born and raised in Aitkin, Minnesota. He graduated from Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota, and the Lutheran

Brethren Seminary. He married Kristin in 1983 and they are the proud parents of two sons and four exchangestudent "daughters." In 27 years of Christian ministries in Connecticut, New Jersey, North Dakota, and now Minnesota, Mark has purposefully and passionately shared the sanctity of human life message via sermons, Bible studies, confirmation classes, school groups, and other youth group opportunities. Mark was involved in prayerful sidewalk marches with his youth group and adult Sunday school class at an abortion clinic in Connecticut and helped lay the groundwork for a crisis pregnancy center in Connecticut in 1984. Mark and Kristin served as missionaries from 1985-89 with the CLBA in France (while learning French) and in Chad and Cameroon; Pastor Mark as an exegete in a Bible translation project and Kristin as a community nurse and health educator. After returning to the US they served parishes in Fargo, North Dakota (where he and Kristin became active in the local Fargo-Moorhead LFL chapter) and Cooperstown, North Dakota. Pastor Mark and Kristin were presented the Dr. Jean Garton Life Award at the 2003 FM LFL Chapter Annual Banquet. In the Fall of 2006, Pastor Mark began pursing graduate studies in exegesis at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri, and in the fall of 2008 joined the faculty at the LB Seminary where he teaches Greek, New Testament Introduction, and first-year preaching. He continues to love preaching and teaching, and looks forward to guest speaking opportunities at worship services, Sunday schools, family Bible camps, youth Bible camps, and conventions. In his spare

time Mark enjoys reading, fishing, traveling, baseball (GO TWINS), and playing Scrabble with his wife!



Rev. Dr. Jeff Gibbs is Professor of New Testament at Concordia Seminary, Saint Louis, Missouri, where he has taught since 1992. Jeff is the faculty sponsor for the Seminary Pro-Life Group. He served in parish ministry at Calvary, St. Helens, Oregon, (1979-86) and Grace, Scappoose, Oregon (1979-89). Jeff is a 1979 M. Div. graduate of Concordia

Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Indiana. His Ph.D. in Biblical Studies is from Union Theological Seminary in Virginia, Richmond, Virginia (1995). Jeff has written scholarly articles as well as more popular pieces. He is the author of several books on the Gospel of Matthew, including the three-volume commentary on Matthew being published by CPH. Pastor Gibbs has been a frequent speaker at conferences for both lay people and pastors. He's also been an essayist and Bible study leader at several synodical conventions. Jeff is an avid (and slow) runner, and he's completed several marathons. Jeff and Renee have been married since September 1, 1973. Renee is widely known for her work in life-affirming work, as well as her efforts to mentor and encourage Christian women and pastor's wives; she holds advanced degrees in both education and theology. Jeff and Renee have two daughters, two sons, and seven grandchildren.



Renee Gibbs is, first and fore-most, a daughter of the King! She is the wife of Dr. Jeff Gibbs who teaches at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, where they have lived for 18 years. Renee has earned advance degrees both in Special Education (Webster University) and in Theology (Concordia Seminary). A leading pro-life advocate, Renee speaks out on behalf of the unborn and in love for those women who have already

been wounded. She frequently speaks on life issues to

groups and seminary classes, encouraging students in their future roles as pastors and leaders. Renee participates in regular prayer vigils at Planned Parenthood. She and Jeff serve as advisors for the seminary life group. She advised the Teens for Life group at Lutheran High, St. Charles County, Missouri, taking teens to Washington, DC, for the March for Life the last 15 years. Renee leads numerous Bible studies and mentoring groups for seminary wives. She also speaks at retreats and other functions for Christian women. She has led many seminary mission trips to Guatemala. Renee taught and consulted in Special Education for 18 years. The Gibbses have four grown children and seven grandchildren.



Anthony Horvath was raised in the Lutheran church. He attended a Lutheran day school from 1st grade through 8th grade, went to a Lutheran high school, and then a Lutheran university, where

he "promptly lost my faith in God while in the pastoral ministry program." This agonizing time of doubt and personal reflection resulted in a return to God and a passionate desire to spare others from having the same experience. He remained in the pastoral ministry program but decided not to become a pastor. At the end of his senior year Anthony was asked to teach religion at a Lutheran high school in Mayer, Minnesota. He taught there for one year, got married, and moved to Rockford. In Rockford, his wife took a position as an elementary school teacher at a Lutheran grade school and a year later he took a position as a religion teacher at Rockford Lutheran, a junior and senior high school. After the birth of their first son, he took a position as a Director for Parish Ministries at a Lutheran church near La Crosse, Wisconsin. With the birth of twin boys, life became chaotic in Wisconsin. The net result was that Anthony resigned from the church in order to get a job he felt would be more likely to sustain his family. He became an over the road truck driver. A little less than a year later it was determined as a family that he needed to come off the road. Ever since, he has been the "stay at home dad," writing books, speaking in various venues, and generally advancing his apologetics ministry. Not too long ago, he and his wife had a fourth child, a girl

(at last!) At the 20-week ultrasound it was discovered that she had Spina Bifida and he and his wife were given the "choice" to "terminate" which they emphatically declined. This was a very hard time for them but eventually they "sucked it up" and prepared for life with their daughter. Honestly, life has been good. In large part, because of his experience with his daughter, he has of late spent more time writing and reflecting and, when opportunity arises, speaking on life issues. Even though he has always been passionately pro-life and energetically anti-abortion, he never felt he had credibility to speak on the matter except in the abstract. That is no longer the case. Hopefully in the sharing of his story lives can be saved.



Kim Ketola (formerly known as Kim Jeffries) has over thirty years of broadcast and broadcast journalism experience including hosting and producing programs on KTIS, KS95, and WCCO Radio and TV. She was Executive Producer and Host of *Life Redeemed*[™], a radio outreach offering healing and hope after abortion,

featuring interviews with Randy Alcorn, John MacArthur, and other leading Christian writers and teachers. Kim is a lay ministry leader who has organized and presented professionally accredited conferences to equip licensed therapists, social workers, and counselors, and help individuals recover from the emotional ancl spiritual wounds of abortion. She is a trained peer counselor and speaker with New Life Family Services Conquerors post-abortion support groups, and she has led groups at MN Teen Challenge and elsewhere. She holds a B.S. in Ministry from Northwestern College, where she also serves as Adjunct Faculty in Communications. Kim is a frequent prolife speaker at churches, pregnancy centers, and community groups. Community leadership includes serving as Chair, Minnesota Governor's Council on Faith and Community Service Initiatives, Board Member at Union Gospel Mission and volunteering with Charis prison ministry and Missionary Evangelism to Corrections jail outreach. Kim contributes articles to Minnesota Christian Chronicle and has also been published in the Star Tribune, Pioneer Press, and Minnesota Women's Press. The National Alliance for the Mentally Ill awarded Kim their 2003 Annual Media Award. Mrs. Ketola and her husband, Bruce, are parents to four children in their blended family.



Rev. Dr. James I. Lamb grew up in the small, southern Minnesota town of Good Thunder. There he married his childhood sweetheart, RoxAnne. The Lambs have been blessed with two sons and two daughters-in-law, a granddaughter, Jamie, and grandsons, Luke, Grant, and Zane. Dr. Lamb and RoxAnne live in State Center,

Iowa. Dr. Lamb received a B.A. in Biology from Mankato State University in 1973. In 1975 he enlisted in the USAF and served as an Emergency Medical Technician at the USAF Academy Hospital in Colorado Springs. He entered Concordia Seminary, Saint Louis in 1978, served his vicarage year at St. Paul, Royal Oak, Michigan, and graduated with a Master of Divinity in 1982. In 1994 he received his Doctor of Ministry from Concordia, Saint Louis. Prior to accepting the position of Executive Director of National Lutherans For Life in April, 1996, Dr. Lamb served as senior pastor at St. Paul, Garner, Iowa, for fourteen years. During this time he also served as Circuit Counselor, member of the board of directors for Lutheran Family Service of Iowa, chairman of the board of directors for a community/school youth program, spiritual advisor for a local Lutherans For Life chapter, and chaplain of the Garner Volunteer Fire Department. He presently serves on the Sanctity of Life Committee for the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod Life Ministries. He is the author of numerous brochures, articles, and essays connecting God's Word of Life to the life issues.



Dr. Ryan MacPherson graduated with a Ph.D. in History and Philosophy of Science from the University of Notre Dame in 2003 and since then has taught American History, History of Science, and Ethics in Science at Bethany Lutheran College (Evangelical Lutheran Synod) in Mankato, Minnesota. He also has completed several courses at

Bethany Lutheran Theological Seminary during his time at the college. Dr. MacPherson's publications include a research article concerning creation-evolution controversies in the Princeton Library Chronicle, a review essay in Journal of the History of Biology, a review essay in Lutheran Synod Quarterly, and several devotional articles in the Lutheran Sentinel (Evangelical Lutheran Synod) and Clearly Caring (Christian Life Resources). He recently contributed two chapters to the new book, Here We Stand - A Confessional Christian Study of Worldviews, published by Northwestern Publishing House: "The Church and Science through the Ages" and "Teaching Objective Morality to a Postmodern Audience." With Peter Anthony and Paul Madson, Dr. MacPherson is co-editing an historical anthology of ELS essays concerning the significance of Christian education, to be published by the ELS Historical Society. Dr. MacPherson has taught working research scientists at Chesapeake Biological Laboratory in Solomons, Maryland, and presented a workshop on the ethical dimensions of science at the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center in Edgewater, Maryland. One of his recent conference papers was entitled "Using Science to Teach about God's Wonderful Creation: Why Genuine Marriage Is Heterosexual," delivered in April 2007 to the WELS Minnesota District Pastors' Conference. Dr. MacPherson also serves on the Board of Directors of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod Historical Society and is founding president of The Hausvater Project, which promotes a confessional Lutheran vision for family, church, and society. He lives in Mankato, Minnesota, with his wife, Marie, and their children.



Alan Shlemon has dedicated his life to training Christians to thoughtfully articulate their faith and values. He realizes that when people are properly equipped, they're more confident about talking with others. Because they become more skilled in maneuvering in conversation, they're more effective at sharing their faith. Prior to training Christians, Alan

worked in hospital-based physical therapy for ten years. He trained people who could no longer walk, stand, or even sit to rebuild their strength, gain confidence, and physically achieve former levels of function. During this career he still served the body of Christ by teaching and was a bold witness for Jesus on bioethical issues at hospitals in Southern California. The positive reaction he received from students and coworkers propelled him to turn his full-time attention from working with physical bodies to spiritual ideas. That transition brought him to work with Stand to Reason. Alan has been interviewed on numerous radio shows, been featured as a guest on JCTV's Top 3 television show, and has a forthcoming chapter on homosexuality in Apologetics for a New Generation by Harvest House Publishers. He is a graduate of California State University, Long Beach and is currently pursuing his graduate degree at Biola University. He lives in San Diego, California with his wife, Jennifer, and two children.



Dr. Kevin Voss became director of the Concordia Bioethics Institute and assistant professor of philosophy at Concordia University Wisconsin in August 2003, accepting the position left vacant by the retirement of the Rev. Dr. Richard C. Eyer. From 1981 to 1995, Dr. Voss was in private

practice in Northeast Wisconsin as a dairy veterinarian, with a focus on reproductive medicine. Because of allergies and a willingness to serve the Lord in the pastoral ministry, he left practice to earn a Master of Divinity Degree from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, in 1999. Dr. Voss is currently completing his Ph.D. in health care ethics at Saint Louis University which will give him two

doctoral degrees. The title of his dissertation is Religious Beliefs and Reproductive Counseling Practices of Clergy. Dr. Voss has earned two specialized certificates during his doctoral program at Saint Louis University. He received the Certificate of Empirical Research Methods in descriptive ethics and a certificate in university teaching skills. Publications include: "Conflict between Families and Providers: Avoiding Treatment Disputes," Health Care Ethics USA, 2003, "Online Peer Commentary: One Field, Many Disciplines, One Goal," American Journal of Bioethics, fall 2002, and "Science: The Truth and Hype About Stem Cells" in In the Beginning: A Collection of Essays and Bible Studies on the Sanctity of Early Human Life, LCMS Sanctity of Life Committee, 2007. Dr. Voss has served on the executive committee for the Center for Health Care Ethics and the Institutional Review Board (IRB) of Washington University in Saint Louis. He is currently a member of the Columbia-St. Mary's Ozaukee Hospital Ethics Committee and sits on the LCMS Sanctity of Life Committee. Dr. Voss is a native of Brillion, Wisconsin. In 1982, he married his wife, Kaye, whose hometown is Bonduel. They have two children.



A Brief History of Lutherans For Life



Lutherans For Life began as a personal dream of Dr. C. Jack Eichhorst. His efforts to make that dream a reality commenced in 1976 when Jean Garton, Robert Jensen, Leigh Jordahl, Sam Nafzger, Richard Neuhaus, and Michael Rogness agreed to meet with him to "explore common

concerns about human life issues with a view to organizing a pan-Lutheran group to deal with them." Seventeen people attended a meeting in St. Louis on May 24, 1977, initiated by Dr. Ralph Bohlmann, Rev. Sam Nafzger, and Dr. J.A.O. Preus. As a result, a committee consisting of Jack Eichhorst, ALC theologian; Jean Garton, LCMS laywoman; Leigh Jordahl, LCA professor; and Eugene Linse, LCMS professor, met at Concordia College, St. Paul, Minnesota, on August 22, 1978, to consider an organizational structure. A name was chosen; a philosophy was adopted; and officers were selected. Garton became President; Eichhorst, Vice President; Jordahl, Secretary; and Linse, Executive Director.

As its first official act, Lutherans For Life sent letters of announcement to the presidents of the American Lutheran Church, the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches, the Lutheran Church in America, The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, and the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Church. A request was made of the presidents to urge their members to observe October 1, 1978, as Respect Life Sunday and "with prayer and meditation express thanks for their own lives and also sadness for the lives of pre-born children that have been terminated because they were unwanted."

Lutherans For Life (LFL) was officially incorporated on April 17, 1979, with its national office located on the campus of Concordia College, St. Paul, Minnesota. At the time of incorporation, the first board consisted of Dr. George Muedeking and the officers. Soon the board included twelve members; and over the years, numerous Lutheran pastors and laypeople faithfully served on the National Board of Directors.

Rev. Edward Fehskens joined the ministry as Executive Director in August of 1985. In May of 1991, the head-quarters of LFL relocated to Benton, Arkansas, southwest of Little Rock. A structure that housed the "Congo Mercantile" for 63 years was converted into an office as well as living quarters for the director's family.

The philosophy of LFL was revised in 1992. It states:

Lutherans For Life believes that the Church is compelled by God's Word to speak and act on behalf of those who are vulnerable and defenseless. The crisis of our time is the repudiation of biblical truth manifested in the wanton destruction of innocent human life through legalized abortion-on-demand and the growing threat to the lives of others through legalized assisted suicide and euthanasia. Therefore, we will strive together, as Lutherans For Life, to give witness from a biblical perspective to the Church and society on these and related issues such as chastity, post-abortion healing, and family living.

From 1992-1996, LFL produced a national radio program on the *Jubilee* network. *Speaking of Life* featured daily commentaries by Dr. Jean Garton.

In 1995, Rev. Fehskens resigned his position as Executive Director to return to full-time parish ministry. During his ten years of service, he helped build a strong network of chapters and state affiliates. At the 1995 convention, Dr. Jean Garton was honored for 17 years of service. Linda Bartlett was elected President of the board of directors of LFL.

Rev. Dr. James I. Lamb became the new Executive Director in April of 1996. In May of that year, LFL's headquarters relocated to Nevada, Iowa, north of Des Moines.

Lutherans For Life, Inc. has assisted in the development of Lutherans For Life of Australia and Lutherans For Life of Canada in addition to working with interested pro-life Lutherans in other countries. At the request of a member of the USSR Academy of Sciences in Moscow, LFL provided them with resources on abortion, chastity, and post-abortion healing. In 1996, LFL was invited to Romania (at that time the country with the world's highest abortion rate) to assist in the development of Pro-Vita, a Romanian Christian pro-life group. Since that trip, LFL has supported Pro-Vita financially; many brochures have been translated into the Romanian language; and two caring pregnancy centers have been developed. Opportunities exist for continued involvement with Pro-Vita.

The Board of Directors adopted the following Mission Statement in 1997:

The Mission of Lutherans For Life is to witness to the sanctity of human life through education based on the Word of God.

The Campus Life Project, which seeks to encourage students to become advocates for human life, was launched at Concordia University, Mequon, Wisconsin, in September 1997. Other Concordias, as well as secular colleges, have benefited from this project.

National LFL officially went "on-line" in 1997, providing Christian pro-life resources and timely information by way of a web site:

www.lutheransforlife.org

In 1998, Lowell Highby came on staff as the first Director of Media and Development (now Director of Communications). The intent of this position is to enhance and expand the avenues of LFL's outreach and its "For Life" message.

In 2004, Diane Schroeder, who had been Treasurer, was elected President of Lutherans For Life. Diane took over from Linda Bartlett who stepped down after serving as President since 1995.

In early 2009, LFL contracted with Kay L. Meyer, from St. Louis, Missouri, to work part-time as Director of Development.

In May of 2010, George Munyon joined the staff as Director of Operations.

Also in May of 2010, James P. Schroeder, began serving LFL as a Christian Estate Planning Counselor.

LFL has developed a wide variety of pro-life and family resources. Videos have included: Bearing Burdens (an honest look at euthanasia), Family Matters (an exclusive interview with Dr. James Dobson), For Life (the mission, ministry, and biblical foundation of LFL), Who Broke the Baby (based on Dr. Garton's book of the same title), and Who Will Speak For Me? (featuring the music of Amy Grant and Don Wharton). LFL of Missouri received a substantial grant to develop Celebrate the Life (now out of print), a sanctity of human life curriculum formerly available through Concordia Publishing House. The educational manual, Living With Dying, provides materials on euthanasia, assisted suicide, "living wills," and other end-of-life issues. The quarterly journal, LifeDate, is mailed to LFL members and interested persons nationally and internationally. Directions is published quarterly for LFL Chapters, State Federations, and Life Ministry Coordinators. Life Sunday resources, including sermons and bulletin inserts, are new each year. LFL's Life Resource Catalog offers an assortment of brochures, tracts, Bible studies, curricula, and audiovisuals from the Christian

perspective.

Resources for pastors, congregations, and lay people are provided at the national headquarters and in the field through LFL Leadership/Speaker Training Seminars, and other educational events. *Word of Hope*, LFL's postabortion ministry, brings hurting women together with Christian caregivers so that hope, healing, and reconciliation with the Lord might be experienced. LFL affiliates have established caring pregnancy centers, post-abortion ministries, and congregational programs that provide supportive services for those confronted with unplanned pregnancies. LFL holds an annual national conference.

LFL co-sponsored two *amicus curia* ("friend-of-the-court") briefs to the U.S. Supreme Court and continues to motivate Lutheran citizens to be "salt and light" in a culture that increasingly embraces death as a solution to human problems. LFL is represented on the National Pro-Life Religious Council.

Numerous LFL state affiliates and local chapters exist to serve both individuals and congregations. Participants in the Life Ministry Coordinator Program work to encourage pastors and congregations. As a grassroots organization which desires to help others live out their faith according to God's will, Lutherans For Life seeks to share Jesus Christ through teaching, caring, and serving.


